Root Square Mean Labeling (RSML) of New Crown Graphs

Abstract: A graph G with a links and b nodes is called RSMG if it is possible to label the links $x \in V$ with distinct labels f(x) from 1, 2, ..., q + 1 in such a way that when every node $\left[f(y)^2 + f(y)^2 \right] = \left[f(y)^2 + f(y)^2 \right]$

$$e = uv$$
 is $f(e = uv) = \left[\sqrt{\frac{f(u)^2 + f(v)^2}{2}}\right]$ or $\left[\sqrt{\frac{f(u)^2 + f(v)^2}{2}}\right]$, then

the resulting nodes labels are separate. In this case f is called a RSML of G. In this article we prove that some new crown graphs such as

 $C_n \cup (P_k \odot K_3), (C_n \odot K_1) \cup (P_k \odot K_1)$
, $(C_n \odot K_1) \cup (P_k \odot K_2), (C_n \odot K_1) \cup (P_k \odot K_3)$ are root square mean graphs.

I. INTRODUCTION

In this article, the graphs which are simple, countable and undirected with a links and b nodes. For a labeling graph we refer to Gallain [2]. For all other standard terminology and notations, we follow Harary [3].

The idea of RSML has been introduced by Sandhya, Somasundaram and Anusa in 2014 [8]. Some new results proved of Root Square Mean Labeling of Some Crown Graphs by R. Abdul Saleem and R. Mani [1]. In this article, we examine the RSML of New Crown graphs. Some new examples are presented and verified. We now give the definitions which are necessary for the present investigation.

Definition 1.1:

nodes labels are separate. In this case f is called a RSML of G. **Definition 1.2:**

A walk in which $u_1u_2...u_n$ are distinct is called a path. A path on n vertices is denoted by P_n .

Definition 1.3:

A closed path is called a cycle. A cycle on n vertices is denoted by C_n .

Definition 1.4:

The two graphs $G_1 = (V_1, E_1)$ and $G_2 = (V_2, E_2)$ is a graph $G = G_1 \cup G_2$ with link set $V = V_1 \cup V_2$ and the node set $E_1 \cup E_2$.

Definition 1.5:

The Corona of graphs G_1 and G_2 is the graph $G = G_1 \odot G_2$ formed by taking one reproduction of G_1 and

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 $|V(G_1)|$ reproductions of G_2 where the i^{th} link of G_1 is adjacent to each link in the i^{th} reproduction of G_2 .

Definition 1.6:

Let $G_1, G_2, ..., G_n, n \ge 2$ be n replicas of a immovable graph G. The graph G found by adding a node between G_i and G_{i+1} for i = 1, 2, ..., n-1 is called a path union of G.

II. MAIN RESULTS

Theorem 2.1

 $C_n \cup (P_k \odot K_1)$ is a RSMG.

Proof

Let $u_1u_2...u_n$ and $v_1v_2...v_n$ be the vertices of two cycles C_n in G.

Let $u_1 = w_1 w_2 \dots w_k = v_1$ be the vertices of the path P_k . Let w'_1, w'_2, \dots, w'_n be the pendent vertices attached at $w_1 w_2 \dots w_k$ respectively.

Let $G = C_n \cup (P_k \odot K_1)$. Define a function $f: V(G) \to \{1, 2, ..., 3n + k\}$ by $f(u_i) = i + 1$ for $1 \le i \le n - 1$ $f(u_n) = 1$ $f(v_i) = n + k + i + 4$ for $1 \le i \le n - 1$ $f(v_n) = n + k + 4$ $f(w_i) = n + 2i - 2$ for $1 \le i \le n - 1$ $1 \le i \le n - 1$

Then clearly the nodes labels are separate. Hence f is a RSML of G.

Example 2.1.1:

The RSML of $C_4 \cup (P_k \odot K_1)$ is given below:



Theorem 2.2

 $C_n \cup (P_k \odot K_2)$ is a RSMG.

Proof

Let $u_1u_2...u_n$ and $v_1v_2...v_n$ be the links of two cycles C_n in G

Let $u_1 = w_1 w_2 \dots w_k = v_1$ be the vertices of the path P_k . Let w_1', w_2', \dots, w_n' and $w_1'', w_2'', \dots, w_n''$ be the pendent vertices attached at $w_1 w_2 \dots w_k$ respectively.

Let $G = C_n \cup (P_k \odot K_2)$. Define a function $f:V(G) \to \{1,2,\dots,4n+k\}$ by $f(u_i) = i+1$ for $1 \le i \le n-1$ $f(u_n) = 1$



$$\begin{split} f(v_i) &= n+k+i+8 & \text{ for } 1 \leq i \leq n-1 \\ f(v_n) &= n+k+8 \\ f(w_i) &= n+3i-4 & \text{ for } 2 \leq i \leq k-1 \\ f(w_i') &= n+3i & \text{ for } 1 \leq i \leq n-1 \\ f(w_i'') &= n+3i+1 & \text{ for } 1 \leq i \leq n-1 \end{split}$$

Then clearly the node labels are separate.

Hence f is a RSML of G.

The RSML of $C_4 \cup (P_k \odot K_2)$ is given below:



Theorem 2.3

 $C_n \cup (P_k \odot K_2)$ is a RSMG.

Proof:

Let $u_1u_2...u_n$ and $v_1v_2...v_n$ be the vertices of two cycles C_n in G. Let $u_1=w_1w_2...w_k=v_1$ be the vertices of the path P_k . Let $w_1',w_2',...,w_n',w_1'',w_2'',...,w_n''$ and $w_1''',w_2''',...,w_n'''$ be the pendent vertices attached at $w_1w_2...w_k$ respectively.

Let
$$G = C_n \cup (P_k \odot K_3)$$
 be a function $f: V(G) \to \{1, 2, ..., 5n + k\}$ by
$$f(u_i) = i + 1 \text{ for } 1 \le i \le n - 1$$

$$f(u_n) = 1$$

$$f(v_i) = n + k + i + 12 \text{ for } 1 \le i \le n - 1$$

$$f(v_n) = n + k + 12$$

$$f(w_n) = n + k + 12$$

$$f(w_i) = n + 4i - 6 \text{ for } 2 \le i \le k - 1$$

$$f(w_i') = n + 4i - 1 \text{ for } 1 \le i \le n - 1$$

$$f(w_i''') = n + 4i \text{ for } 1 \le i \le n - 1$$

$$f(w_i''') = n + 4i \text{ for } 1 \le i \le n - 1$$

Then clearly the edge labels are distinct.

Hence f is a RSML of G.

The RSML of $C_4 \cup (P_k \odot K_3)$ is given below:



Theorem 2.4

 $(C_n \odot K_1) \cup (P_k \odot K_1)$ is a RSMG.

Proof

Let $u_1u_2...u_n$ and $v_1v_2...v_n$ be the vertices of two cycles C_n in G.

Let $u_1 = w_1 w_2 \dots w_k = v_1$ be the vertices of the path P_k . Let w'_1, w'_2, \dots, w'_n be the pendent vertices attached at $w_1 w_2 \dots w_k$ respectively. Let u_1', u_2', \dots, u_n' and v_1', v_2', \dots, v_n' be the pendent vertices attached at u_1, u_2, \dots, u_n and v_1, v_2, \dots, v_n respectively. Let $G = (C_n \odot K_1) \cup (P_k \odot K_1)$.

Define a function
$$f:V(G) \rightarrow \{1,2,...,5n+k\}$$
 by $f(u_i) = 2i+1$ for $1 \le i \le n-1$ $f(u_n) = 1$

$$f(v_i) = 2n + k + 2i + 4$$
 for $1 \le i \le n - 1$
 $f(v_n) = 2n + k + 4$

$$f(w_i) = 2n + 2i - 2$$
 for $2 \le i \le k - 1$

$$f(w_i') = 2n + 2i \text{ for } 1 \le i \le n - 1$$

 $f(u_i') = 2i + 2 \text{ for } 1 \le i \le n - 1$

$$f(u'_i) = 2i + 2$$
 for $1 \le i \le n - 1$
 $f(u'_n) = 2$

$$f(u_n) = 2$$

 $f(v_i') = 2n + k + 2i + 5 \text{ for } 1 \le i \le n - 1$
 $f(v_n') = 2n + k + 5$

Then clearly the edge labels are distinct.

Hence f is a RSML of G.

The RSML of $(C_4 \odot K_1) \cup (P_k \odot K_1)$ is given below:



Theorem 2.5

 $(C_n \odot K_1) \cup (P_k \odot K_2)$ is a RSMG.

Let $u_1 = w_1 w_2 \dots w_k = v_1$ be the vertices of the path P_k .

Let w_1, w_2, \dots, w_n and w_1, w_2, \dots, w_n be the pendent vertices attached at $w_1w_2 \dots w_k$ respectively.

Let $u'_1, u'_2, ..., u'_n$ and $v'_1, v'_2, ..., v'_n$ be the pendent vertices attached at $u_1, u_2, ..., u_n$ and $v_1, v_2, ..., v_n$ respectively.

$$G = (C_n \odot K_1) \cup (P_k \odot K_2)$$

Define a function
$$f:V(G) \to \{1,2,...,6n+k\}$$
 by $f(u_i) = 2i+1$ for $1 \le i \le n-1$ $f(u_n) = 1$ $f(v_i) = 2n+k+2i+8$ for $1 \le i \le n-1$ $f(v_n) = 2n+k+8$ for $1 \le i \le n-1$ for $1 \le i \le n-1$

Then clearly the edge labels are distinct.

Hence f is a Root Square mean labeling of G.

Example 2.5.1:

 $f(v'_n) = 2n + k + 9$

The RSML of $(C_4 \odot K_1) \cup (P_k \odot K_2)$ is given below:





Theorem 2.6

 $(C_n \odot K_1) \cup (P_k \odot K_2)$ is a RSMG.

Proof:

Let $u_1 = w_1 w_2 \dots w_k = v_1$ be the vertices of the path P_k .

Let $w_1, w_2, ..., w_n, w_1, w_2, ..., w_n$ and $w_1, w_2, ..., w_n$ be the pendent vertices attached at $w_1w_2 ... w_k$ respectively.

Let $u_1, u_2, ..., u_n$ and $v_1, v_2, ..., v_n$ be the pendent vertices attached at $u_1, u_2, ..., u_n$ and $v_1, v_2, ..., v_n$ respectively.

$$G = (C_n \odot K_1) \cup (P_k \odot K_2)$$

Define a function $f:V(G) \rightarrow \{1,2,...,9n+k\}$ by $f(u_i) = 2i + 1$ for $1 \le i \le n - 1$
 $f(u_n) = 1$
 $f(v_i) = 2n + k + 2i + 12$ for $1 \le i \le n - 1$
 $f(v_n) = 2n + k + 12$
 $f(w_i) = 2n + 4i - 6$ for $2 \le i \le k - 1$
 $f(w_i') = 2n + 4i - 1$ for $1 \le i \le n - 1$
 $f(w_i'') = 2n + 4i$ for $1 \le i \le n - 1$
 $f(w_i''') = 2n + 4i + 1$ for $1 \le i \le n - 1$
 $f(w_i''') = 2n + 4i + 1$ for $1 \le i \le n - 1$
 $f(w_i''') = 2n + 4i + 1$ for $1 \le i \le n - 1$

 $f(v_n) = 2n + k + 13$ Then clearly the edge labels are separate. Hence f is a RSML of G.

 $f(v_i) = 2n + k + 2i + 13$ for $1 \le i \le n - 1$

Example 2.6.1:

 $f(u_n) = 2$

The RSML of $(C_4 \odot K_1) \cup (P_k \odot K_3)$ is given below:


